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THE FIVE ROADS OF REPENTANCE SAINT JOHN CHRYSOSTOM

Let me describe to you five ways of repentance; each is different, but all point toward heaven.

The first road is the *acknowledgement of sins*. If you acknowledge your sins to God, he will forgive you; and this act of acknowledgement will help you stop sinning. Let your conscience be your accuser, so that you will not have to face a far different accuser at the Lord's tribunal.

The second road of repentance is the *forgetting of the wrongs of others*. This requires you to control your temper and to forgive the sins that

others have committed against you. If you forgive others, the Lord will forgive you.

The third road is *prayer*: not perfunctory routine prayer, but fervent, passionate prayer in which you lay yourself wholly before God.

The fourth road is *generosity*, in which by acts of thoughtful love you make amends for the sins you have committed.

And the fifth road is *humility*, whereby you regard yourself as having no virtue, but only sins to offer to God; he will then take the burden of sin from your back.

At times it will be right to travel on one of these roads, at other times to travel on another. But ensure that every day you walk along at least one of them. — St. John Chrysostom

<u>Did You Know???</u>



...that ministry and agriculture can go hand in hand??? Well, they can...and do!!! Pastor Bryan Wilson, who serves the Hickory Stand and Oak Forest charge in the Smoky Mountain district, along with the evangelical outreach known as Still Waters Landing (SWL), are the proof of just how successful this pairing can be!

Wilson grew up farming in Tennessee and always knew that somehow he would incorporate it into his ministry. He knew that the accepted view of rural churches is that they don't have as much to offer as

suburban or urban churches. This viewpoint is emphasized by the fact that our rural communities sometimes house some of our poorest communities. However, Pastor Wilson also knew that poor people in rural areas oftentimes still own small tracts of land where some profitable agriculture can, and does, go on. Knowing this fact, Wilson wanted to build something that could change the mindset of rural communities and make a difference in the lives of the residents. This dream, this vision, slowly turned into a reality. "One of the best things about serving God is when our ideas are turned into something that otherwise would have seemed impossible."

Pastor Wilson's two churches are in Brasstown and Hayesville, NC. Two of his lay members, who saw the importance of practicing good stewardship, offered the use of a tract of land in Hayesville, NC. Then, a friend of his from Tennessee offered to donate two pregnant sows, a boar, and fifty chickens. The God-sized dream of ministry and agriculture began to grow quickly!

Still Waters Landing, in Hayesville, NC has as its motto, "Renewing the community through food, fellowship, farming and faith while ensuring that the poorest in the community gain access to the highest quality of food." The biggest hurdle that the launch of this endeavor initially faced was that a project of this size required a full-time farm manager. This meant a salary. After making application for, and receiving a grant from the Duke Endowment, the farm was able to afford this salary. Now, after four years of hard work, Still Waters Landing continues rapid growth. The farm partners with a local food bank, where they serve the community.

The thing that most surprised Pastor Wilson was the evangelical aspect of the farm. SWL now has pastoral relationships with migrant workers, beer brewers, restaurant owners, feed store owners, school teachers, school administrators, and students. Many of these people do not attend either of the pastor's churches; however they now have a pastor! This farm isn't just about feeding people, although it does indeed; it is also a place to teach lessons, do retreats, have volunteer days, and hold worship services. Middle schoolers and high schoolers came to the farm this past year. SWL also hosts peer learning days during which folks from all over the state come to learn about anything from non-profits becoming self-sustaining to pasture-raised pork. The plans are also in place for an internship program in which they will identify two at-risk high school students and bring them onto the SWL team in order to learn about sustainable agriculture. This will show the students another option for their future. It will retain the youth in their own community. It will provide the students with an hourly wage, their fair share of the fresh produce, and a quarter of a pig! They will also be sent to agricultural conferences as a way of continuing their education.

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Still Waters Landing is evidence that faith, added to what is already in a community, can make something beautiful. We certainly can all agree that this type of project can be duplicated if a church has the time, the volunteers, the ability to work, and a heart for the community. And, even though the farm needed a grant to grow, Wilson is hoping that the farm will be self-sustaining in three years. When it is all said and done, Still Waters Landing is an inspiring example of what God can do in and through your church community.

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<u>The Recipe Box</u>

If you are like most of us, you feel sort of stuck in a rut with your summer time cooking. We have grilled and grilled and grilled. We have enjoyed the abundance of squash and cucumbers from the garden...or the neighbor's garden. The summer corn was glorious and the strawberries and peaches were juicy and delicious. Now though, here in the Dog Days of Summer, we find ourselves looking for something fresh...something we haven't tasted in a long time...something to sort of wake us up and make us feel alive. May we suggest this version of Key Lime Pie? This recipe is easy. It is a no bake pie, which means you will not heat up your kitchen. It uses fairly simple ingredients and is light and refreshing. The recipe originally appeared on the website togetherasfamily.com but has been modified slightly to be even simpler. We hope that you will try, and enjoy, Easy No Bake Key Lime Pie!

Easy No Bake Key Lime Pie

- 1 (6 ounce) store-bought, prepared graham cracker crust
- 2 (8 ounce) blocks of cream cheese, softened
- 1 (14 ounce) can of sweetened condensed milk
- 1/3 cup key lime juice
- 2 Tablespoons powdered sugar
- 1 (8 ounce) tub of whipped topping
- 1 lime

In a bowl with a hand mixer, or bowl of a stand mixer, beat together the softened cream cheese, and sweetened condensed milk until combined and no lumps remain. Add in the key lime juice and powdered sugar and blend until combined. If desired, you can add the zest of about half of the lime to add more flavor. Pour mixture into the prepared graham cracker crust and smooth out on top. Cover with the plastic lid that came with the crust and refrigerate over night, or at least 8 hours. (Over night is preferred.) When ready to serve, top the pie with the whipped topping. As an added element of beauty and fun, zest the other half of the lime over the whipped topping. Serve and enjoy this cool, heat-beating, tasty summer pie!!!

Notes:

- 1. Key Lime juice is typically found in the juice aisle of the grocery store, right by the lemon juice. If you can't find Key Lime juice, regular lime juice is fine but the Key Lime juice is highly recommended.
- 2. The best way to soften the cream cheese is to place both unwrapped cream cheese blocks onto a microwave safe plate and microwave for 30-45 seconds. You want it soft to prevent lumps in the filling mixture, but watch it carefully that you do not over heat.
- 3. When zesting the lime, be sure to get just the very outer surface of the skin. The more you zest into the skin, the more bitter the lime zest will become.
- 4. Don't judge the taste of the pie on your tasting of the filling just after you mix it. As the pie sits in the fridge, the flavors develop and the pie does get slightly sweeter.



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What Do You Say When Asked...


Are we praying as Christ did? Do we abide in Him? Are our pleas and spirit the overflow of His pleas and Spirit?

Some Hot Fun in the Summer Time!!!

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


Something to Think About

Recommended Reading


(This month's Recommended Reading article is written by Sherri Brown.)
