






Foster Village Charlotte Supporting Those Who Are Supporting Others

General Conference 2024 Be Informed...Be in Prayer!

General Conference is coming soon! Meeting every four years, General Conference is the only entity that speaks for the denomination. The United Methodist Book of Discipline, updated every four years, incorporates changes made by General Conference.

The General Conference theme is "... and know that I am God" from Psalm 46:10. The entire verse (NRSV) reads: "Be still, and know that I am God! I am exalted among the nations. I am exalted in the earth." The verse number may vary in non-English translations. The General Conference Worship and Music Team plans to create a new focus each day by pairing the theme with different words, such as "love" and know that I am God, or "believe" and know that I am God.

Delegates from Africa, Europe, Asia and the U.S. will attend the 11-day gathering, which could attract as many as 7,500 people. Some 862 delegates, elected from around the world, will gather to set policy and direction for the church, as well as handle other important business.

The changing global nature of the church is due in part to the rapidly growing membership in central conferences. Voting delegates will come from the United States (55.9%), Africa (32%), the Philippines (6%), Europe (4.6%) and concordat churches that have close ties to The United Methodist Church (1.5%). Half will be clergy, half laity. The percentage of delegates from central conferences, which was 16% in 2000, has increased significantly since the start of this millennium. The percentage of delegates from central conferences for the most current four quadrenniums was 29% in 2008; 38%, 2012; 42%, 2016; and 44%, 2020.

The coming General Conference faces multiple proposals aimed at shaping the future of The United Methodist Church. A listing and brief description of those proposals will be available to you within the next couple of Weeks.



Much good goes on too. Each day opens with worship. Countless individual, small group, and corporate prayers are said. Do you like to read true stories? Are you enamored with things related to the British Isles, and in particular Scotland? Do you enjoy a book that dabbles in the medical field? When you read a good, descriptive narrative, are you transported to the very setting of the story? Well, if any of these describes you as a reader, then we have just the selection for you!

Mary J. MacLeod, also known as Julia, along with her husband, had grown tired of the pace and noise of life near London, England. They were longing for a better place to raise their young sons. They stumbled upon their dream while vacationing on a remote island in the Scottish Hebrides. Taken by its wind-swept terrain, they were soon the proud owners of an almost derelict croft house (a farmer's stone cottage), on a "small acre" of land. Being trained as a nurse, Mary assumes the duties of the island's district nurse in short order. <u>Call the Nurse</u> is her account of those first enchanted years that she and her family spent in Papavray, getting to know its folks as both patients and friends.

At the close of the book, Mary is reminiscing about the island that she has grown to love. As you read her words below, allow yourself to see and feel and smell all that she is remembering...

"I can almost see the snow on Ben Criel, the ice on Loch Annan, and the tall plumes of peat smoke rising from little white croft houses in the still frosty air. I want to smell again the heather and bog myrtle, feel soft summer rain on my face, and watch the fierce fire of a setting sun as it paints the sky with orange, gold, and crimson light, lending its mirrored glory to the sea and its surreal splendor to the shimmering slopes of distant mountains. Later, I would be left in the peace of the long Northern twilight, to dream of the days when we lived and loved and worked in this blessed place."

<u>Call the Nurse</u> is the debut offering of Mary J. MacLeod. Within its pages, <u>Call the Nurse</u> combines a nurse's compassion with Gaelic fortitude to give us a collection of wonderful, true stories from rural Scotland. It is a treasure trove of nostalgia, community, humor, beauty, and the human condition. I think that so many times we tend to picture the rest of the world living just as we do. It is when we read first-hand accounts of life in another part of the world, in a different time, that we realize that life continues for others in a much different way from our own experience.

I think that just about anyone would enjoy reading <u>Call the Nurse</u>! Yes, you are introduced to a few new words from the Gaelic language. And yes, you will need to understand that this is a different life, in a different place, in a different time. But, if you pick it up, you will find yourself immersed in a beautiful, rich, deep, and moving account of life in Papavray. This incredible journey is well worth the read! <u>Call the Nurse</u> is available from any online bookseller and can also be found in our own Lending Library at Pleasant Grove. Happy Reading!!!

The Recipe Box

History is full of interesting factoids about chocolate and its introduction to the Middle East. Jesus' time did not include chocolate. But aren't we glad that we live in a world with chocolate! Today's recipe includes that wonderful ingredient that reminds us of the word, "Choco-holic!" Enjoy!!!

Chocolate Chip Cake

package of yellow cake mix
cup of water
cup of canola oil
eggs (large or extra-large)
large package of instant vanilla pudding
bar of bittersweet or semi-sweet chocolate
package of chocolate chips




Mix together the cake mix, water, oil, eggs, and pudding. Grate the chocolate bar and add to the mixture. Fold in the package of chocolate chips. Spray your bundt pan with cooking spray and then dust the pan with flour. Pour the batter into the pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 45-55 minutes. Use a toothpick to check for doneness. Cool on a rack for 15 minutes or so, then turn onto a plate. For a festive look, sprinkle the top of the cake with powdered sugar.
